

# A 1 For C.A.F.C.I.



In August we were presented with an opportunity to purchase a condo unit. Unfortunately, we were unable to close the deal due to a lack of available funds or a letter of commitment for a mortgage. This incident magnifies the need for our organization to be able to demonstrate a more significant and consistent stream of income, if we are to obtain a commitment letter.

As such, be on the lookout for a call-for-

assistance as we enter another phase in our efforts to purchase a Home of Our Own. One option we are considering: setting up a for-profit business as a means for generating steady income.

Participation in the **Home of Our Own** project is available through the Buy-A-Brick program. Visit the web page at www.cafcipbc.org and click on the "**Home of Our Own**" tab or call Radcliffe "Woody" Brown at 561.791.3344 for more information. We have made it easier to take part in the program by facilitating monthly payments to buy a brick. Monthly payments of \$50 for a \$1,000 brick and \$150 for a \$3,000 brick are available.



Despite the above setback the search for a property continues, with a primary focus on lease-to-own options, including the possibility of purchasing land or commercial condominiums. Another option being considered is jointly purchasing and sharing a property with a partner organization, thereby reducing the cost of acquisition.

# SHIRLEY CHISHOLM

The first Black candidate for a major-party nomination for President of the United States of America



2024 is a historic year. Fifty-two years ago, Shirley Chisholm, a Black woman of Barbadian background, was bold and audacious enough to run for the presidency of the United States of America. The first Black congresswoman, she was also the first woman to run for the Democratic

Party's presidential nomination, and the first Black candidate for the presidency to seek nomination by one of the two major parties. Her famous slogan "Unbought and unbossed," was a reflection of her fighting spirit and fearlessness in the face of power.

When Chisholm announced her candidacy she said, "I am not the candidate of Black America, although I am Black and proud. I am not the candidate of the women's movement of this country, although I am a woman, and I am equally proud of that... I am the candidate of the people of America. And my presence before you now symbolizes a new era in American political history."

Fifty-two years later, a daughter of a Jamaican immigrant and an Indian immigrant, is running for the office of president of the United States of America. Shirley Chisholm would be proud. Fighting against the odds and the times, withstanding racist bigots who threatened her life, Chisholm persevered. Through that perseverance she forged a path that other women, and other Blacks, and People of Color, have now followed. We commend Ms. Chisholm, and we recognize her.

Born in the borough of Brooklyn, New York, in a Caribbean enclave, she went back and forth between Barbados and her Brooklyn community. Those communities formed her, instilling in her the confidence to see and know her worth, the grit to withstand nearly insurmountable challenges, the fortitude and ambition to go where no one like her had gone before.

Having the courage to forge a path where previously none existed, to put one's self at the forefront of change, all while knowing that the risks will be extraordinary, was no small feat five decades ago, and it is no small feat now.

We look back in wonder when we think about the perilous times in which the congresswoman lived. When we envision the racial animus and threats of violence, we are stunned by her fearlessness. We know it was remarkable and uncommon, but not solitary. There were other leaders like her, willing to risk their lives and their safety to advance community.

Hidden in our communities and our schools today, there are still such leaders, needing to be guided, nurtured, mentored and supported. And it is because of that spirit of capability and possibility that CAFCI continues to support our students and their aspirations, because we know there are more Shirley Chisholms among them; because we don't want to have to wait another 52 years to make probable what Congresswoman Chisholm has made possible today.

### OCTOBER IS BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

QUICK FACTS ABOUT BREAST CANCER

- About one in eight U.S. women and one in 726 U.S. men will develop breast cancer over the course of their lives.
- In 2024, an estimated 310,720 women will be diagnosed with <u>invasive breast cancer</u> in the U.S. An estimated 56,500 people will be diagnosed with <u>ductal carcinoma in situ</u> (<u>DCIS</u>), a non-invasive breast cancer.
- An estimated 42,250 women will lose their lives to <u>stage</u> IV or <u>metastatic</u> breast cancer in 2024.
- In 2024, there were over 4 million women living with a history of breast cancer in the US.
- About 9% of all new breast cancer cases are diagnosed in women 45 and under.
- Though Black women have a lower <u>incidence</u> of breast cancer than white women, Black women are 40% more likely to die of breast cancer.

These numbers remind us there is still urgent work to do — more than we can accomplish in just one month.

### COLUMBUS DAY – Monday, October 14<sup>th</sup>

Columbus Day is observed annually on the second Monday in October. Columbus Day 2024 is a day of remembrance and celebration that honors Christopher Columbus's expedition to the Americas. It recognizes the significance of his journey, which opened the door to European exploration and the eventual colonization of the Americas. Columbus Day provides an opportunity for communities to reflect on their cultural heritage and share the contributions of Italian-Americans and the broader immigrant experience.

While Columbus Day is celebrated in the United States, it is worth noting that its observance has evolved over time and is subject to debate and discussion regarding its historical context and impact on Indigenous communities.

INDIGENOUS PEOPLES DAY – Monday, October 14<sup>th</sup> Indigenous Peoples' Day is celebrated on the second Monday of October to honor the cultures and histories of the Native American people. The day is centered around reflecting on their tribal roots and the tragic stories that hurt but strengthened their communities.

The first seed of Indigenous Peoples' Day was planted at a U.N. international conference on discrimination in 1977. The first state to recognize the day was South Dakota in 1989. Berkeley, California, and Santa Cruz followed suit.

- 5 Facts About Indigenous Peoples' Day
- 1. Female warriors: Native American women fought alongside men in battles, the most popular among them being the Buffalo Calf Road Woman of the Northern Cheyenne tribe.
- 2. Popcorn: The Indigenous Americans were the first to domesticate the strains of maize that produced popcorn thousands of years ago.
- 3. Maria Tallchief: The first Native American (and American) to dance at the Bolshoi Theatre in Moscow and with the Paris Opera Ballet was Maria Tallchief.
- 4. Hockey: The Native American tribes of Foxes, Saux, and Assiniboine played a game called shinny, which is where hockey came from.
- 5. The sequoia tree: The sequoia tree is named after the revered Cherokee leader Sequoyah, who created an alphabet for his people.

# **OCTOBER ... A MONTH OF CELEBRATIONS & AWARENESS**

The month of October carries with it a vibrant tapestry of cultures and traditions as diverse as the people who celebrate them. Throughout this autumnal month, we embark on a global journey through a myriad of captivating holidays and celebrations. From the spooky festivities of Halloween in the Western world to the deeply meaningful observances in other regions, it's a time that underscores the significance of embracing and understanding diverse cultures.
