# Member Spotlight





JAMAICA W. I.

From the time she was a little girl growing up with her Rastafarian grandmother in Nine Mile, Bull Bay in St. Andrew, Jamaica, Marva Wilks has been an education champion. She has distinct memories from that time, including memories of reggae music superstar Bob Marley parking his Volkswagen in her grandmother's yard on his way to play football, and of Freddy McGregor, before he got big in music, tutoring her uncle in math.

But a memory that is more fondly etched in her mind and that seems to have been a sign of the future to come, is of herself lining up soda bottles and mango seeds in front of her bedroom door when she was five or six years old.

She laughs recalling: "I would always get in trouble for writing on the door. I would pretend the door was my chalkboard and the bottles and mango seeds were my students, and I would write big white letters and numbers on the door with my white marl chalk and ask the students questions."

It was from that time that Marva developed a love of reading and writing, and a fierce belief in the power of education to transform lives.

She says "I've always believed education was the gateway to opportunity and to future success, and I'm not talking only about a college education. It could be an education in HVAC (heating, ventilation and air conditioning), or as a bricklayer, but if there is a field you are interested in, you must educate yourself in it if you want to progress."

Marva emigrated from Jamaica to the United States—Connecticut—as a young teen, and shortly afterwards she and her family moved to Florida. She attended Dillard High School in Fort Lauderdale, and later went to college at Georgia Southern University in Statesboro, Georgia, and then to Nova Southeastern University in Davie, Florida.

Her belief in education as a way to secure a better future became more entrenched in college and she decided to major in education, earning first a bachelor's and then a master's in the subject. She later acquired certification as an education specialist.

The use of digital tools and online learning platforms was rapidly expanding when Marva graduated. Sensing a need for a bridge between educators and the new technologies, Marva decided to create an education technology consulting firm that would train educators how to successfully use the newest technology resources.

Over the next twenty years Marva did just that, travelling to different states, and training administrators, principals, teachers, and other education professionals on how to master the new technologies.

Six years ago, Marva shifted gears and became the Program Manager for the Miami-Dade School District's education technology programs, serving some 400 schools throughout the district and educating administrators and educators in how to use data management systems, analytics' tools, online platforms, and other education technologies more effectively.

Her work is both in-person and virtual, with her traveling to different schools to provide in-person instruction when needed, but doing much of her training via Zoom and other digital platforms.

Marva says she loves her work because it improves academic systems and gives educators and administrators the tools to create even greater results in their work.

She says as a child she could not have imagined the career she has created: "I don't think there's a road map for this, honestly. It is purely based on my passion. I put myself in the learner's shoes all the time. I think, "What if that was me? What would I want? How would I want to learn? And I go from there. I want my work to be meaningful and to give people the tools to improve their lives."

Marva's passion for teaching has been such that for many years, even while running her consulting firm, she worked at several Florida universities as an adjunct, teaching English, World Literature, and other subjects.

Not content with merely sharing the gift of education through her work, she also started a nonprofit, Education Gateway Foundation,' which she ran with her husband, Wayne Wilks, for five years.

Through Gateway, the couple was able to provide scholarships, uniforms, books and school fees for school children in Jamaica. Over the course of its existence, the foundation sponsored students in 13 schools throughout the island, from grades 6-11, paying the annual school expenses for promising young scholars whose families were economically challenged.

Gateway served some 100 students before disbanding in 2019. Many of those students have since gone on to academic success at university.

Marva says the nonprofit is something she'd like to resume in the future when she has more time. "The gratitude was unbelievable and knowing we had opened the door to opportunity for so many was overwhelming."

Where she finds the time is a wonder, but Marva stays busy. She is active in multiple volunteer efforts, including serving as a member of CAFCI's Student Assistance Fund (SAF) Committee and raising annual funds for graduating Palm Beach County high school seniors to attend college. She is a youth advisor for her sorority, Delta Epsilon Zeta, mentoring girls ages 9-13 in leadership development, and she serves as the sorority's Z-Hope coordinator, finding opportunities for her sorority sisters to serve in the community.

Marva is a member of the Urban League Guild, is active in her church, and often offers her services as a mortgage loan officer—a certification she obtained during COVID—for free to community members seeking to purchase a home.

She and her husband are high school sweethearts. She says he is her cheerleader and partner in all business and community-service ventures. His work is also in service to the community. She explains: "Wayne is a probation supervisor. He also volunteers in a fatherhood program that teaches formerly incarcerated fathers how to re-establish relationships with their children."

The couple has three children and celebrated their 30th anniversary in May.

Marva has been a CAFCI member for ten years, and a member of the Student Assistance Fund Committee for six. She credits the SAF Committee SAF with providing vital resources to students. "If I could encourage anyone reading this to do any one thing, it would be to contribute \$100, or whatever amount they can, to the Student Assistance Fund before the March fundraising deadline," she says. Those funds, makes a tremendous difference in our young people's lives."

Troop 111 had quite a few things happening this November. These events were enjoyable for all who participated. We kicked off the month with our annual Scouting for Food event where





# A market for C.A.F.C.I.



In August we were presented with an opportunity to purchase a condo unit. Unfortunately, we were unable to close the deal due to a lack of available funds or a letter of commitment for a mortgage. This incident magnifies the need for our organization to be able to demonstrate a more significant and consistent stream of income, if we are to obtain a commitment letter.

As such, be on the lookout for a call-for-

assistance as we enter another phase in our efforts to purchase a Home of Our Own. One option we are considering: setting up a for-profit business as a means for generating steady income.

Participation in the **Home of Our Own** project is available through the Buy-A-Brick program. Visit the web page at www.cafcipbc.org and click on the "**Home of Our Own**" tab or call Radcliffe "Woody" Brown at 561.791.3344 for more information. We have made it easier to take part in the program by facilitating monthly payments to buy a brick. Monthly payments of \$50 for a \$1,000 brick and \$150 for a \$3,000 brick are available.

Despite the above setback the search for a property continues, with a primary focus on lease-to-own options, including the possibility of purchasing land or commercial condominiums. Another option being considered is jointly purchasing and sharing a property with a partner organization, thereby reducing the cost of acquisition.

### **DECEMBER ... A MONTH OF CELEBRATIONS & AWARENESS**





Let's face it: Holiday shopping isn't for everyone. Choosing a thoughtful present for each person on your gift list can be time-consuming and frustrating — even without the added pressure of (hopefully) staying within the budget you've set.

Whether you eagerly look forward to Black Friday and Cyber Monday each year or adopt a "Bah humbug" attitude between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day, we've come up with some savvy holiday shopping tips to make this year's shopping experience stress free, budget friendly, and — dare we say? — enjoyable.

1) Set your budget before you start holiday shopping--Even if you're not planning to limit your holiday spending, it's a good idea to have a set holiday shopping budget in mind. Don't forget to include the cost of Secret Santa or group swap gifts (and remember — you don't have to spend the full amount).

- Make your holiday shopping list ahead of time-Know exactly who you need gifts for before heading to the store or browsing online. Not only will it save you time-it'll preserve your sanity (and your bank account). Divide your holiday shopping list into categories: immediate family, relatives, friends, colleagues, acquaintances, teachers/service providers (babysitter, mailman, the Amazon delivery driver who comes to your house daily) and check off each name once you purchase their gift. Pro tip: Be practical. If you don't know someone well enough to know what they'd like, consider whether you should even buy them a gift, or whether a handwritten note would be just as meaningful.
- 3) Know the best time to shop during the holidays--A gift-buying schedule is a great way to avoid feeling overwhelmed during the holiday season. You'll need to consider when you should start your holiday shopping, obviously the fewer weeks (or days) you have left, the more gifts you'll likely need to purchase in a short time. Keep in mind that you'll need to prioritize time-sensitive gifts: think teachers, colleagues, friends, service providers—anyone you'll need to gift before the actual holiday.
- 4) Find ways to save on holiday shopping--Is the best deal available online or in store? Is now the best time to buy that gift? It might be a better idea to wait until next July when furniture tends to be on sale—and give it to him for his birthday. Perhaps an interim gift is best until the apt time for the Big Gift's purchase arrives.
- Consider DIY gifts--Not only could homemade gifts save you money during the holidays, but they'll feel much more personal to the recipient than the same item bought in a store.
  - Pro tip: Plan ahead to give yourself enough time to purchase needed materials or ingredients and to make the gifts
- 6) Don't rule out secondhand gifts--If you have a family member or friend who's a collector or routinely shops in thrift stores, chances are you can find unique, low-cost gifts at thrift stores, yard sales ... even in your own home! Be certain that the recipient will appreciate a gently-used gift.
- 7) Avoid last-minute holiday shopping--Holiday shopping can be stressful enough on its own. But compounding that stress by waiting until the last minute to purchase gifts is probably not your best move. The closer you get to the actual holiday, the greater the chance that availability and selection will be limited (or nonexistent), especially for "hot" items. Give yourself every opportunity to enjoy the holiday season by starting your shopping as early as possible. Need another reason to shop sooner, than later? Inflated "holiday" shipping costs. Overnight shipping can sometimes cost more than the item itself! So shop early and save money and the likelihood of an avoidable headache.
