CAFCI and the Village of Royal Palm Beach Celebrate DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. DAY

The Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day celebration commenced at 8:30 am on Monday, January 15th with a complimentary continental breakfast. Attendees were entertained with the Caribbean flair of the steelpan sound of the Silver Bird production of Junior Stevens. Towards the end of the program, Mr. Stevens graciously performed again, captivating us with his version of the Michael Jackson steps of "Beat It", much to the delight of the audience.

There were approximately 450 guests in attendance. The increase in attendance this year was due in part to Mayor Fred Pinto highlighting the celebration as one of the Village's major events in an interview with a local TV station, in addition to an ad in the local newspaper, and the many flyers distributed at the Royal Palm Beach Cultural Center, gas stations and grocery stores. Thank you to all who helped get the word out. We had an amazing turnout because of your efforts. You all are stars!

The Honorable Cymonie S. Rowe

The theme of MLK Day was "Everyone can be great because anyone can serve," one of Dr. King's many inspirational quotes. The Honorable Cymonie S. Rowe, the keynote speaker, referenced that theme throughout her 30-minute speech.

Mayor Pinto reminded the audience of Dr. King's record of service and sacrifice for community, and of his elevation of the mission of justice and equality at the cost of his own personal safety. Even as he

welcomed and acknowledged all dignitaries, the mayor encouraged attendees to remember Dr. King's philosophy of justice for all people, and to

contribute in any way possible to the actualization of Dr. King's vision.

The MLK Day program began with stirring performances of the National Anthem 'The Star Spangled Banner,' and the Black National Anthem, 'Lift Every Voice and Sing' performed by Samara Lewis. Ms. Lewis' performance was followed by The Mariachi Group with Mercedes Torres who led the audience in rousing renditions of the group's musical numbers. Delighted audience members sang, clapped and danced along.

Immediately following the Wildcats, Jasmine Aris, a young gospel praise dancer, took the audience to church with a captivating lyrical dance and "in the face" performance to the gospel song "The Battle Is Not Yours". Her performance received a standing ovation.

Master of Ceremony, Michael Aitcheson, entranced event attendees with his smooth and sonorous tones. A true expert at his craft, he kept the audience engaged with jokes that had them laughing and piqued their interest about what was coming next.

Without question, event attendees were entertained and deeply satisfied with the proceedings. This was evidenced by the fact that after I thanked the audience for attending and acknowledged the Cultural Committee team members and the Village staff, attendees clapped vigorously and remained seated, a clear indication they wanted more.

Before the event concluded, a moment of silence was requested in honor of Marjorie Aiken, a team member of the committee, who had recently passed.

Member Spotlight

HAVE YOU MET ... JOHNNY H. DAVIS?



Johnny Davis is 88. Talking about his life, his enthusiasm bubbles over. "I had a good life," he says. "It was fun. I have no regrets. If I could, I'd do the whole thing over again."

Johnny's been an active CAFCI member since 2012. Born in Georgia, he does not have any Caribbean roots, but that has not lessened his feeling of connection. Drawn to CAFCI because of well-orchestrated cultural events like the MLK Day celebration, his commitment to the organization was cemented when he learned about the scholarship fund.

He explains: "Education is expensive. CAFCI donating funds to graduating high school seniors is a good thing. I donate every year."

A big part of Johnny's enthusiasm springs from the work he has done. He has had several careers, but it was his work as a New York City subway conductor and motorman that gave him the greatest satisfaction.

Working as a motorman was a childhood dream. "I spent most of my life in Queens and would ride the front subway car, look out and see the trains weaving and wobbling and all the different colored lights changing, but I didn't know what it was about. When I went to subway school, I learned what those lights represented."

When Johnny talks about the world of the tracks beneath the city's sidewalks, it is as if he is speaking about a mysterious universe that is unseen by the average commuter, and even less understood. It is a world of multicolored flashing lights, each with a different meaning, of multiple trains converging at the same point, and of motormen who must know the routes better than the backs of their hands and remain alert and ready to make life-changing decisions in an instant.

Little known trade secrets include moving tracks—yes, tracks that are moved remotely by the tower operator in a faraway booth—whose proper connection the motorman must know to prevent deadly accidents caused by taking the wrong route.

Johnny drove a 600-foot train, carrying thousands of people five days a week for twenty years. "That is a lot of lives in your hands," he acknowledges.

On his last day, his supervisor pulled him off the rails: "He said, 'You have gone twenty years without any derailment or tragic incident. We don't want somebody jumping in front of your train today."

Driving the trains was a responsibility that can only be fully grasped by those who have experienced it, but Johnny says he would do it again.

Twice married, Johnny is the father of five, and the grandfather of six. In late 2023, he suffered a severe loss when his eldest daughter died.

Soon to enter his 9th decade, his civic mindedness has not dimmed. He recalls with pride serving on the grand jury in New York thirteen years in a row. Commuting from Boynton Beach, he regularly attends CAFCI events, and is active in his church, Grace Episcopal. He laughs, "I'm right up there with the priest on Sundays. When they hit that organ note I am the guy in the front with that cross, marching in."



FEBRUARY... A MONTH OF CELEBRATIONS & AWARENESS

BLACK HISTORY



MONTH is an annual celebration of achievements by African Americans and a time for recognizing their central role in U.S. history. Also known as African American History Month, the event grew out of "Negro History Week," the brainchild of noted historian Carter G. Woodson and

other prominent African Americans.

Since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month. Other countries around the world, including Canada and the United Kingdom, also devote a month to celebrating Black history.

The Black History Month 2024 theme, "African Americans and the Arts," explores the key influence African Americans have had in the fields of "visual and performing arts, literature, fashion, folklore, language, film, music, architecture, culinary and other forms of cultural expression."

DID YOU KNOW?.....

The Idea For Black History Month Originated in 1926
When first conceptualized by Carter G. Woodson
in 1926, the time of recognition was originally
Black History Week. He proposed that the
second week of February become known as
"Negro History Week," coinciding with the
birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick
Douglass. Both of these historical figures fought
against slavery.

In 1969, a Week Became a Month

In 1969, teachers and students at Kent State University in Kent, Ohio, proposed making Negro History Week a month-long celebration of black history, known as Black History Month. The first Black History Month was celebrated in 1970.

In 1976, it Became a National Observance

Thanks to President Gerald Ford, Black History Month was again brought into the spotlight in 1976. Ford highlighted the connection between American history and African-American history by recognizing the celebration officially during the celebration of the United States Bicentennial, also corresponding with the 50th anniversary of Negro History Week. Ford pushed for all Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

It Was Introduced in the United Kingdom in 1987
In 1987, Ghanan activist Akyaaba Addai-Sebo
founded the month in the United Kingdom. It is
celebrated in the fall there, with the month of
October being chosen in order to incorporate
black history into the curriculum for school-age
children. The United Kingdom also focuses on
African-Caribbean history because of the United
Kingdom's close ties to Caribbean countries and
a large amount of Caribbean-English children in
the country.

Canada First Celebrated Black History Month in 1995

Canada was close behind the UK, establishing their own Black History Month in 1995. The idea was first proposed by a member of the House of Commons in Canada, Jean Agustine. She was the first black woman to be elected to Parliament and proposed the official recognition of February Black History Month in Canada. The motion was unanimously passed, and Canada annually highlights the contributions of Black Canadians to their country on this date.

Black History Month Extended to Ireland in 2010

The fourth country to officially recognize Black
History Month, Ireland did so in 2010. Part of
movements from both the Africa Irish
Development Initiatives and the Black History
Month Ireland groups, the involved groups, and
the country aims to combat racism and
discrimination by increasing awareness of other
cultures, their achievements, and their
struggles.

REGGAE MONTH: On January 9, 2008 the Government of Jamaica announced that the month of February was to be declared officially Reggae Month. This was done to highlight and celebrate the impact of the musical genre on the country's social, cultural and economic development. Additionally, the birthdays of two of Jamaica's and Reggae Music's late icons are

commemorated during the month of February: The late Dennis Brown also known as the 'Crown Prince of Reggae', is celebrated on February 1, while the late Robert Nesta 'Bob' Marley, the renowned 'King of Reggae' is celebrated on February 6.

Reggae Month 2024 will be observed from February 1 to 29 under the theme, 'Come ketch di RIDDIM'.

For further details on events and activities, Minister Grange encouraged Jamaicans to download the Reggae Jamaica mobile app from Google Play Store. The app will be the main vehicle for updating the public about the events.

PRESIDENTS' DAY is Celebrated on the third Monday in February (February 19, 2024), Presidents' Day commemorates all the former US presidents' achievements and sacrifices.

In the early 19th century, the day was acknowledged as a fasting and prayer day. People would offer prayers to God and ask for protection over their president.

Presidents' Day History

The history of the Presidents' Day holiday dates back in 1800 after the death of George Washington. People celebrated his birthday on February 22nd as a way to remember the first president in American history. In 1879, Washington's Birthday was signed into law as a federal holiday. In 1971, the Uniform Monday Holiday Act shifted the day to be celebrated on the third Monday of February every year. The day also changed its name to Presidents' Day as a way to commemorate all the presidents of the United States.

Presidents' Day Traditions

Presidents' Day is a time of patriotic remembrance. Before the holiday was declared as a day to celebrate all the presidents of the United States, portraits of George Washington would grace the front pages of newspapers every February 22nd.

Today, Presidents' Day is marked by staged celebrations and reenactments. Some states require teachers of public schools to teach students about the accomplishments of former US presidents, mostly focusing on the lives of Washington and Lincoln.
