

Picnic in the Pank





Member Spotlight

HAVE YOU MET ... BARRINGTON BERRY?





Barrington Berry is a prankster, but you wouldn't know it to look at him. From the outside, he is reserved and a man of few words. Styled from head to toe in striking outfits, like his pastel pink shorts and matching top with fancy fedora with silk ribbon tipped to the side and summer canvas shoes, sporting polished skin with buffed shoulders and calves, Barrington looks both suave and serious.

That's just the exterior, his wife Heather says. For although Barrington seems both reserved and immaculate, without a button out of place, at home he is a complete jokester. On the day of this interview, he pranked his wife by sneaking up from behind and scaring her enough to make her jump, then collapsed in laughter before he'd even said good morning.

Barrington is organized and meticulous. His knack for making sure everything is in its place is an offshoot of his military and law enforcement background. After graduating high school, Barrington served in the U.S. army for six years as an artillery specialist and later became a corrections officer in New York for 25 years before retiring.

In Corrections, Barrington never experienced inmate hostility and confrontation the way many of his co-workers did. He credits that to the fact that "I treated those guys with respect, and they treated me the same way. I never tried to prove that I had power over them."

Because of this, Barrington thrived in Corrections. The prisoners under his guard respected him enough to comply with his directions, and his division won awards for being clean and orderly and was frequently showcased to visiting officials.

Meticulous in all things, Barrington takes his fitness seriously. He goes to the gym daily and, in fact, it was fitness that brought him and his wife together. The two met at the gym where they were training.

His love of fitness is a continuation of his background as an athlete. From his school days in Jamaica to high school in America and his stint in the army, Barrington ran track and belonged to numerous soccer teams where he played the position of left back defender.

The walls of his home office are lined with medals and certificates, many of them for his athleticism, but others for outstanding community service, including his designation as a Man of the Year by his church. Among the medals he is proudest of are those from the army, one for Army Achievement, and the other for Good Conduct.

Barrington's years as a military and law enforcement officer are reflected in his seriousness, says his wife, but that persona doesn't fully reflect the man.

"Barrington," she laughs, "is known by his friends as Mr. Disco because he loves to dance to any and every kind of music." The kicker is that, although he will dance for hours at a party, she says, you'll never find him drinking or smoking, as he's never smoked or imbibed alcohol a day in his life.

Barrington and his wife have been married for 15 years and have five children between them. Born in Kingston, Jamaica, Barrington immigrated to America in 1979 with his mom and sisters. He has been a CAFCI member for approximately six years and is on the Entertainment and Food committees.

Beyond CAFCI, Barrington is a Board Member of his community's HOA. He is also a trustee and usher in his church, Merrell United Methodist of Fort Lauderdale, as well as a member of several committees. Retired and living in West Palm, he drives to Fort Lauderdale three or four times a week to participate in church activities

Barrington has a great love for music, people, and community. At home you can catch him casually attired, listening to Classic Reggae, vibing to the music, and working out.

Message from Past SAF Award Recipient

KATE DEVINEY 2022 SAF AWARD RECIPIENT

Greetings!

I hope this note finds you well, as the summer season bears down upon us. I have just completed my sophomore year at Florida State University. I am grateful for the college scholarship you awarded me, and am writing to update you on my progress and activities.

I earned a 3.9 GPA this past semester, while working a parttime job. I continue to work very hard on my studies, and am thrilled that my diligence has earned me a spot on the Dean's List (GPA 3.5 and above) each semester since starting at FSU.

I completed my year-long work as a research assistant to a PhD. candidate in the Florida State University Askew School of Public Administration and Policy. I did so through the Undergraduate Research Opportunity Program. For my research, I analyzed data on government structures and their influence on certain disparities, through the lens of government responsiveness. My research improved my ability to think critically and draw reasonable conclusions. These are critical skills I will need in my future career as a lawyer.

On April 3, 2024, I presented my research project at the 24th Annual President's Undergraduate Research Symposium. The day was quite exciting for me, as it was the culmination of a year of intense and challenging work!

This past year I also completed my term as Social Chair and Executive Board Member for the FSU Women in Pre-Law Society. I really enjoyed planning and executing creative, educational, and enjoyable social events for the organization. I particularly enjoyed bringing in speakers to present on legal education topics. One exceptionally engaging speaker was the Executive Director of the Henry Latimer Center for Professionalism at The Florida Bar, who spoke on the very important topic of Florida lawyers' ethical responsibilities.

Next year I will continue my leadership in the Women in Pre-Law Society. The Executive Committee of the organization has selected me to serve as the Vice-President of External Affairs for the 2024-2025 school year. In that position, I will assist the President in her duties, and assume the President's responsibilities in her absence. Community service was also a very important part of my life this past year. During the Spring semester 2024, I rendered 234 hours of community service, and during the Fall semester 2023, I rendered an additional 195, for a total of 429 community service hours for the 2023-2024 school year. Those hours were audited by FSU and are verified on my "ServScript," which is the FSU transcript for community service.

I logged some of my community service hours while serving as Director of Community Engagement and Executive Board

Member for "The Big Event" Tallahassee. "The Big Event" is one of the nation's largest one-day student run community service projects. As Director of Community Engagement, I established and oversaw alliances between Tallahassee non-profit organizations and the hundreds of college-based student, faculty, and staff volunteers from three local colleges and universities, who provided community service to these organizations on Saturday, February 24, 2024, the day of "The Big Event."

On that day, hundreds of university students and staff gave a day of community service to ten Tallahassee non-profit organizations, including Catholic Charities, Bond Community Health Center, and the Leon County Sheriff's Office. I worked very hard with the rest of the "The Big Event" team to ensure that the day was a resounding success, and it was!

After The Big Event, I was honored and gratified to receive a personal note from Michael Barrett, Executive Director of Catholic Charities of Northwest Florida, stating:

Kate, I regret not having the opportunity to meet you on Saturday but want to THANK YOU on behalf of Catholic Charities of Northwest Florida for your engagement and getting volunteers to give of their time and talent by helping the Tallahassee offices past Saturday. The Big Event was a big success and Catholic Charities of Northwest Florida is grateful to be a partner with you. Please keep us on your list for future events.

I am thrilled to have been a part of such a successful community service effort! Community service will remain an essential part of my life as long as I live.

In a few weeks I will be departing for Costa Rica, where I will spend the summer taking classes taught entirely in Spanish at The Instituto San Joaquin de Flores, for twelve hours of college credit. I am pleased to have been awarded a US State Department Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship for my Spanish immersion studies. I aim to become a fluent Spanish speaker, which will assist me in my future legal career, and more generally.

I look forward to living with my host family, getting to know other university students, and savoring the sights and sounds of Costa Rica! For a few months I will be living the "Pura Vida," a phrase used in Costa Rica to express the Costa Rican philosophy of cherishing life's simplest pleasures.

None of my collegiate achievements and experiences would have been possible without your support. I cannot thank you enough. I look forward to providing future updates, and wish you a joyful and restful summer.

CARIBBEAN-AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH



In June 2005, the House Representatives unanimously adopted H. Con. Res. sponsored by Congresswoman

Barbara Lee, recognizing the significance of Caribbean people and their descendants in the history and culture of the United States. On February 14, 2006, the resolution similarly passed the Senate, culminating a two-vear, bipartisan and bicameral effort. The Proclamation was issued by President George W. Bush on June 6, 2006.

During Caribbean-American Heritage Month, we celebrate the achievements and dreams of the millions of people of Caribbean origin now living in the United States while honoring the shared history of joy and perseverance that has united and enriched life across our region for centuries. There is no single Caribbean American identity. The mix of cultures, languages, and religions alive across the United States and the islands reflects the diversity of spirit that defines the American story. Meanwhile, our countries are bound by common values and a shared history — overcoming the yoke of colonialism, confronting the original sin of slavery, and charting new opportunities across borders and generations.

JUNETEENTH also called Freedom Day. African American Independence Day. Jubilee Day. Emancipation Day, is a federal holiday (as of 2021!) **June 17**, celebrating emancipation from slavery in the United States. combination of day commemorates the proclamation of freedom for enslaved people in Galveston, Texas on June 19, 1865.

During the American Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation became official on January 1, 1863. This was an executive order which declared that enslaved people in the Confederate states were free. However, it wasn't until June 19, 1865— 2.5 years after the Emancipation Proclamation was issued, and 2 months after the Civil War ended— that those enslaved in Galveston, Texas (the westernmost state in the Confederacy) were released from slavery. On that day, approximately 2,000 Union troops led by Major-General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston to announce that the Civil War was over and that the 250,000+ enslaved people in Texas were officially free.

One way to celebrate Juneteenth: Watch What is Juneteenth and Why Do We Celebrate? This animated video from BrainPOP is suitable for a variety of age groups and explains the history of Juneteenth.

2024 HURRICANE SEASON IS HERE - SURVIVE DURING!!!

Eastern Pacific: May 15-November 30 | Atlantic: June 1-November 30 | Central Pacific: June 1-November 30

• Evacuate immediately if ordered to do so. Take critical supplies and documents with you. Follow evacuation routes and directions from local officials. Do not drive around barricades. Drive carefully and be cautious of strong winds and heavy rain.

If you do not evacuate, take shelter indoors and stay away from windows and doors.

- + If there is no flooding, make sure your safe shelter is on the lowest level that will not be affected by flood water. Take shelter in a FEMA safe room, an International Code Council (ICC) 500 storm shelter or a small, interior windowless room in a sturdy building.
- + If you experience flooding, go to the highest level of the building to avoid becoming trapped by rising flood water but do not climb into a closed attic.
- Get inside a safe shelter or a sturdy building as soon as possible if you are outdoors, in a vehicle, in a manufactured or mobile home, or in a temporary structure during a hurricane.
- Pay attention to updates from weather stations and news sources to stay informed. Follow advice from local authorities. Take action when advised to do so.
- Use a generator, grill or camp stove ONLY outdoors and at least 20 feet away from any building openings like windows, doors or garages to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Turn around, don't drown! Do not walk, swim or drive through flood waters. Just six inches of fast-moving water can knock you down and one foot of moving water can sweep your vehicle away.
- Do not drive during a hurricane. Wind gusts can overturn vehicles and roads and bridges could collapse.
- Conserve mobile device batteries for emergency use.
